Course Description

A critical thinking exploration of historical and contemporary issues in criminal justice. This includes the study and analysis of the core principles underlying the criminal justice system, components of the American criminal justice system (police, courts, and corrections), criminal behavior theory, crime categories, policing models, and career opportunities.

Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the principles, functions, and processes of the major components of the criminal justice system (police, courts, corrections).
- 2. Describe historical and contemporary criminal justice theories and models.
- 3. Distinguish principles of civil and criminal law, and identify Constitutional amendments most relevant to criminal law
- 4. Explain the order of steps and legal processes an offender takes through the criminal justice system, from arrest through trial and sentencing.
- 5. Analyze contentious issues in the criminal justice system, including racism, sentencing, police brutality, and prison overcrowding.

Course Requirements and Assignments

- 1. Chapter Quizzes (15%). Each week we will read 3-4 chapters in the text. There will be one quiz for every chapter, taken on Canvas. You may take the quizzes at any point during the module, but they will close when the module ends. Format will be multiple choice, matching, true/false, fill-in and short answer. *The three lowest scores will be dropped*.
- 2. Exams (30%): There will be one midterm exam, covering Parts I and II in the text. The final exam will be cumulative (covering Parts I-V in the text). Format may include multiple choice, fill-in, short answer, short essay, and diagrams. (CLO1, 2, 3, 4)
- 3. Short Research Assignments (15%): These will be on various topics that supplement and complement readings and lecture. Respond thoroughly, thoughtfully, and substantively for maximum credit. *The lowest score will be dropped*.
- 4. Discussions (30%): Several discussions will be assigned weekly on various relevant topics throughout the semester, and may be related to outside readings or films. *The lowest three scores will be dropped*.
- 5. Podcast! (10%) Listen to an entire season of a podcast (see options on Canvas). Then respond substantively to questions about the issues raised in the podcast. (CLO 4)
