# Writing Competency Through Genres ENGL 100A

### Course Information

ENGL 100A is designed with the goal of preparing you to succeed in 100W, in other upper division classes, and in your profession. You will have intensive practice in prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing academic writing. You will be asked to research, analyze, and reflect on various kinds of writing and to produce a minimum of 5,000 words, including a rhetorical analysis, a report about writing in your chosen discipline, and 3 critical reflective journals on a book-length work of fiction or nonfiction or instructor-selected readings. You'll also prepare brief reflections on how the work you're completing in this class helps you develop strategies for achieving the course learning outcomes (below).

# Course Description and Requisites

Prepares students for 100W through drafting, feedback, and revision to demonstrate writing competency. Develops ability to analyze written genres used in the students' chosen disciplines as well as write analytical and reflective essays.

Prerequisite(s): A3 or equivalent second semester composition course (with a grade of "C-" or better); completion of core GE.

### \* Classroom Protocols

Writing can be a solitary enterprise, but the critical thinking and habits of mind that go into such work can be developed and enriched in community. Thus, it is imperative that you attend class every day and participate in class activities and discussions. Class participation entails: (1) demonstrating that you've completed the readings, (2) contributing to discussions, and (3) completing in-class assignments and activities. Electronic resources such as laptops, tablets, and phones may be used during class only to compose select assignments, or access course materials on Canvas. Please be sure that social media and other distractions not related to our course pursuits are turned OFF during class.

Late work for routine homework assignments is accepted with 10% penalty per day late. Major assignments can be accepted late with advanced notice BEFORE the deadline with explanation of reasons and arrangement for an extension.

Many group in-class activities cannot be made up. Students can be allowed up to 3 excused in-class activities per semester due to emergencies and illnesses with timely instructor notification on the day of the class.

Should a student plagiarize in any ENGL 100A course, the instructor will report the student to the University's Office of Student Conduct and Ethical Development. Also, points will be deducted from the assignment/course depending on the severity of the policy violation.

#### Additional Al Policy

Al is an emerging tool in the workforce and in our daily lives. You will likely encounter and use it in your future career regardless of the field, so you will have to learn how to ethically use Al. It is also important to understand that for you as a developing college thinker and writer, Al may subvert the writing process and prevent the development of necessary skills. One of the course goals is to help you learn to write and communicate effectively, which requires practice. Therefore, you must learn how to create, edit, and recognize high-quality writing yourself. If Al can do these tasks without you, you won't have employable skills. Therefore, you will be responsible for disclosing when and how you used Al and for producing the original human work for any final product based on the following policy:

Students in this writing course are expected to produce their own work based on critical thinking, problem solving skills, and learning. Any work generated by AI (such as ChatGPT) cannot be accepted as students' own work. Students may not submit any AI-generated text and claim it as their own. No AI or machine translation for extensive phrasing, full sentences, or a greater portion of the paper is allowed. The instructor will check the AI score along with originality score in the Turnitin.com report for student submissions. Students must check their Turnitin scores after submitting their final drafts to make sure they are not above 15%. The Instructor may refuse to accept a student's submission as the student's own work based on the AI and originality scores in Turnitin.com and the instructor's investigation of the situation.

We will learn to use Al technology in this class as a means of assistive technology during the writing process. Using Al tools ethically and purposefully can help, and not subvert, students' development of writing skills. Misusing Al by using it to write the majority of the essay without significant contributions or revision or failing to disclose the use of Al will result in consequences ranging from a written/verbal warning to failing the assignment or course and a report to the Student Conduct Board.


## Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)

- 6. Write well organized, well developed essays with a clear thesis
- 7. Identify how types of written texts in a variety of fields (genres) are influenced by audience, situation, and purpose
- 8. Employ research strategies to collect, analyze, and evaluate data from primary and secondary sources.

Rhetorical Analysis Essay	For this assignment you analyze a piece of professional writing in your major or field or work, describing the rhetorical strategies that were used by the author and how these strategies contribute to the purpose of the document.	1,500	50%
Discipline Investigation Essay	In this assignment, you write a report about working in your major field. This report describes an interview you conduct with a professional in your chosen field; you also write about information you collect from at least two outside sources (articles), following appropriate citation and reference styles (APA or MLA).	1500	
Three Critical Reading Reflection Journals	During the semester, we will read <i>The Alchemist</i> , by Paulo Coelho, and other readings selected by you and by your instructor and respond to this reading in a series of required reflective journals. At the end of the semester, you will include these journals in your portfolio.	1,500	25%
Homework, quizzes, and participation	Discussion posts, quizzes, and classroom activities, including fifteen brief reflections on the course learning goals.		25%
