# Course Description and Requisites

From the <u>SJSU Catalog (https://catalog.sjsu.edu/content.php?</u> filter%5B27%5D=HIST&filter%5B29%5D=&filter%5Bkeyword%5D=&filter%5B32%5D=1&filter%5Bcpage%5D=1 &cur\_cat\_oid=17&expand=&navoid=7688&search\_database=Filter&filter%5Bexact\_match%5D=1#acalog\_template\_course\_filter): "Topics include Native American civilizations, Spanish discovery and missions, the Mexican era, the American conquest, the Gold Rush, Chinese immigration, the railroad, growth, development, politics and class conflict."

Outsiders see California as the great exception among American states—totally bizarre, unique, and unfamiliar. More perceptive observers recognize that "California is America, only more so." This course will help you understand that California history has involved many familiar American themes that happened here faster, sooner, and more intensely than anywhere else.

Prerequisites: Upper division standing or instructor consent. All majors welcome.

Grading: This course is letter graded.

**US3 Credit**: Passing this course with a grade of D- or above will satisfy the US3: California Government graduation requirement in American Institutions.

## \* Classroom Protocols

Class meetings will consist of lecture and discussion, accompanied by PowerPoint slides. Come to class on time and remain in your seat while class is in session. Do not distract other students by chatting, passing notes, eating noisily, taking calls, checking messages, playing games, surfing the web, or texting in class. Do not come and go during class. Students who come and go repeatedly may be prohibited from reentering. If you have a question, raise your hand. There will always be time for questions and discussion before class is dismissed. # Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)

#### American Institutions US3: California Government

The American Institutions (AI) requirement is based on the premise that any student graduating from the CSU should have an understanding of the history and governmental institutions of the United States and the State of California. This requirement, which was put in place by the State of California, is laid out in California State University Executive Order 1061. The original mandate appears in the State Education Code Title 5, Section 40404.

#### **US3 Learning Outcomes**

To fulfill the requirements for California Government, students should be able to explain how political decisions are made at the state and local level taking into account the diverse cultures, communities, and environments of California, including the impact of demographic changes on the history and politics of the state and the nation

As students explore the operations of government at the state level, they should be able to evaluate:

- A. the foundations of the California political system, the similarities and differences between the California and U.S. Constitutions, and the relationship between state and local government in California.
- B. the evolving relationships of state and local government with the federal government, such as the relationship with tribal governments; the generation and resolution of conflicts; the establishment of cooperative processes under the constitutions of both the state and nation; and the political processes involved.

You need to discuss assigned readings and videos by name and in sufficient detail to prove that you read them and watched them.

### Open-Notes Exams

Exams in this course will be closed-book, but open-notes. You may freely consult your own handwritten notes on paper during the exams, but nothing else. You may NOT refer to any books, articles, websites, anyone else's notes, or anyone else's answers. You may NOT refer to any typed, printed, word-processed, photocopied or Al-generated materials. You may NOT refer to any computers, phones, laptops, tablets, recorders, smart watches, or other electronic devices. The classroom will be closely monitored during exams. Inappropriate materials will be confiscated and students using them may be guilty of cheating, a violation of Academic Integrity subject to severe grade penalty.

#### Exam Procedure

Turn OFF your phone and put it away before the start of exams. Do NOT use your phone, laptop, tablet, recorder, smart watch, or any other electronic device during exams. Do NOT refer to anything other than your own handwritten notes during exams. Do NOT leave the room during exams without Dr. Gendzel's permission. Do NOT leave the room with the exam or any image, copy, or record of the exam. Do not create, transmit, upload, stream, post, save, archive, circulate, or share any image, copy, or record of the exam. Violation of these rules in Prof. Gendzel's judgment is a violation of Academic Integrity subject to grade penalty for cheating.

#### Makeup Exams

<u>SJSU University Policy S22-2 (https://www.sjsu.edu/senate/docs/S22-2A.pdf)</u> authorizes instructors to require "verification" when students claim "personal reasons" for "absences on days of tests." All students are required to take all exams as scheduled. There are no "excused" absences from exams, except in dire emergencies with official documented verification in the form of hospital records, doctor's note, court documents, military orders, police report, jury duty notice, eviction notice, funeral program, etc. Claims such as "I forgot" or "I overslept" are NOT valid excuses for missing an exam.

You must schedule a makeup exam immediately and provide official documentation of your emergency. Otherwise, you will receive an "F" (0 points) for any exam that you missed. If you miss a makeup exam, you will receive an "F" (0 points) for that exam. In fairness to other students, makeup exams will only be scheduled for those who can provide adequate verification

of a valid emergency in Prof. Gendzel's judgment. Notify Prof. Gendzel at least a week in advance if you will miss an exam due to university-approved activity. Official documentation is required. Makeup exams may vary in format and difficulty from regularly scheduled exams.

### Research Paper (due by 11:59 PM on Thursday, Nov. 20)

You are required to write a Research Paper

(https://sjsu.instructure.com/courses/1613228/assignments/7410710) between 2,000 and 3,000 words (not counting references) based on primary sources about any topic you choose about California history before 1900. Any text beyond 3,000 words will not be read and will not help your grade. You must use at least FIVE different primary source books from the approved database posted on Canvas: "California as I Saw It: First-Person Narratives of California's Early Years (https://www.loc.gov/collections/california-first-person-narratives/)." No other sources are allowed. You are expressly forbidden to use any other sources, including Internet websites or any kind of Artificial Intelligence (AI). Your Research Paper must be submitted to the Research Paper assignments page (https://sjsu.instructure.com/courses/1613228/assignments/7410710) in Canvas and follow all instructions to earn a passing grade. Any paper with fabricated quotations or false references will not earn a passing grade.

### Can You Get Help?

Prof. Gendzel can also review your rough draft, help you with Chicago Style, and make suggestions for improvement—but only in person during office hours or by appointment, not by email or Canvas message, and only once per student. Do NOT email rough drafts or portions of rough drafts to Prof. Gendzel. You may also seek help from the SJSU Writing Center (https://www.sjsu.edu/writingcenter/tutoring/) and/or tutors at SJSU Peer Connections (https://www.sjsu.edu/peerconnections/programs/tutoring.php). You are expressly forbidden to work with other students on this assignment.

### Can You Turn It in Late?

The Research Paper (https://sjsu.instructure.com/courses/1613228/assignments/7410710) is due in Canvas by 11:59 PM on Thursday, November 20. You must submit your paper on time to avoid the lateness penalty. Missing the deadline by up to 24 hours will result in a lateness penalty deduction of –15 points. Missing the deadline by 24-48 hours will result in an additional lateness penalty deduction of –15 points (–30 points total). Missing the deadline by 48-72 hours will result in an additional lateness penalty deduction of –15 points (–45 points total). No papers will be accepted more than 72 hours past the due date/time (including weekends, holidays, vacations, days when class doesn't meet, and

days when campus is closed). Submit late papers to the Research Paper assignments page (https://sjsu.instructure.com/courses/1613228/assignments/7410710), not by email or Canvas message or another other means.

#### Can You Get an Extension?

### Can You Get an Incomplete?

Claims of innocence, ignorance, forgetfulness, good intentions, reliance on others, or technological failures will not excuse cheating or plagiarism. Cheating and/or plagiarism will result in a grade of "F" in this course and possible sanctions by the University, as authorized by Sec. 3.1.6 of SJSU University Policy F15-7.
